# **Lilies as Indigenous Plants**

To traditional gardeners the word Lily conjures up images of common garden plants such as the Aurum lily. Though not so obvious and flashy, many of our indigenous plants are also members of this family and they can be found in Damper Creek.

Most local lilies have a tuberous rootstock which was eaten by the Aborigines, either raw or after roasting. I would not recommend this to our members unless plants are propagated specifically for this reason. Please leave all park vegetation for park users to enjoy.

The most beloved of our indigenous lilies is the Chocolate Lily. With wonderful violet or deep pink flowers, examples can be found flowering in Damper Creek from September to December. Not only are the flowers delightful, but, as the name suggests, the flower emits a chocolate scent, simply delicious! Unfortunately good stands of the Chocolate Lily are easily overwhelmed by the seemingly ever present Panic Veldt, a common invader of domestic gardens and bushland alike.

Also common in Damper Creek is the Bulbine Lily. With its yellow star-like flowers, this plant can develop into dense stands due to easy germination of seeds. This plant has been extensively planted throughout the reserve and it is to be hoped that the original wildflower drifts will once again adorn Damper Creek surroundings. Aborigines ate the tubers steamed or raw.

Many other plants in Damper Creek can also be classified as lilies. The Dianellas can be classified as lilies. There are three species in the reserve, D. admixta, D.longifolia and D.tasmanica. Another attractive member of the Lily family is Burchardia umbellata or "Milkmaids". In undisturbed bushland this can be quite common, but is rare in Damper Creek and has not, to my knowledge, been planted as part of revegetation.

Other common lilies you may find in Damper Creek are the Lomandras, L. longifolia and L. filiformis. Not so common (though examples definitely exist) is the Small Grass Tree Xanthorrhoea minor and the Yellow Rush-lily Tricorine elatior. Many others possibly (even probably) exist. You may like to look out for the Fringe Lily and the Early Nancy. Such plants and others may continue to exist in undisturbed parts of the reserve.

# June Working Bee

June 29<sup>th</sup> was a challenging day with the weather, but it was our most successful planting day yet with 2000 tube stock being planted in record time.

Thirty adults and children registered - and given the possibility that they could have all stayed home by the fire - it was a great effort.
