May Meeting / Gardens for Wildlife

Anna Mezzetti and Daniel from the City of Monash gave the meeting a rundown on the current status of Gardens for Wildlife in Monash. Following a false start in 2017, additional resources and staff have been assigned and it is certain that the programme will now be successful. Following the excellent results achieved in Knox and Whitehorse, we now have a great model to follow and urge FODCR members to involve themselves and their neighbours and friends in the programme.

Gardens for Wildlife is a programme which encourages householders to allocate a portion of their land to plants which are attractive to wildlife. Wildlife to be encouraged includes not only the obvious ones, birds, lizards, frogs, possums etc. but also insects, butterflies, fungi and indigenous plants. Participants are encouraged with a supply of free indigenous plants and advice from "mentors". The intent of this programme is to reverse the trend of the loss of vegetation from private land and to replace the lost vegetation with indigenous plants which are attractive to wildlife.

By these means the effective size of reserves such as Damper Creek, Federal Reserve, and Valley Reserve will be increased and, hopefully, wildlife corridors established between these reserves.

Participation may be limited to planting on your own land or nature strip or you may become part of the mentoring team, giving advice to those keen to take part in the programme. Updates will be given in this newsletter.

Can Melbourne be an "Urban Forest"?

One of the latest efforts to improve the vegetation cover across metropolitan Melbourne, and to help stem the effects of climate change, is a collaborative approach between 32 councils in metropolitan Melbourne. The new strategy "Living Melbourne: our metropolitan urban forest" – released this month by The Nature Conservancy and Resilient Melbourne has mapped vegetation across public and private land in the metropolitan area and is paving the way for a pooled effort to improve biodiversity across different parts of the city.
